Dolomites, a monumental wealth

Experience the World Heritage

The Dolomites, a Unesco World Heritage Site, were born from the sea, which more than 200 million years ago covered the region. Geological and geomorphological natural compositions of extraordinary

importance, they mesmerise visitors because of their grandiose vertically dropping slopes and scenic beauty, but also for their iridescent colours and changing contrasts. Seeing them at sunset is a charming and remarkable spectacle. It's the time when the rocky walls, due to their peculiar composition of calcium carbonate and magnesium, stain pink,



sparkling the phenomenon known as the **“Enrosadira” (Alpenglow)**.

The stage of superb climbing feats, the peaks of Trentino are ideal for sports or relaxing holidays, between walks, climbs and excursions with mountain bikes. To the West are the Brenta Dolomites and the Adamello glacier, the largest in the Alps, and to the East the Dolomiti di Fassa,

Latemar, the Pale di San Martino and the Marmolada, which with its 3,342 metres is the Queen of the Dolomites, the highest peak in the group.

Nature reflected in 300 blue eyes

Waters for sports, relaxation and regeneration

Clear waters that reflect a wide variety of environments, rich colours to get lost in walking on the shore, diving into them in the search for refreshment or to challenge the wind. The **300 Lakes** of Trentino that for the

most part lie 1500 metres a.s.l., with a clear glacial origin, are a large and complex fresco, gems with green and blue hues at the foot of the peaks, forbidden to motorised boats. The one that stands out the most is Lake Garda, where sailing and windsurfing are at home, as well as major international sailing events, thanks to the Ora and Pelèr winds. Not far away is Lake Ledro, whose waters



have preserved a dwelling site dating from the bronze age, while on the Paganella plateau, the Brenta Dolomites are mirrored in the green waters of Lake Molveno. If the Lakes of Caldonazzo and Levico are the very symbol of summer in Valsugana, in the heart of Valle dei Laghi, the body of water of Toblino with its castle and its reed beds, a chest of biodiversity, remains the most photographed and depicted of all the lakes of Trentino. Tumultuous water, like that of the Noce River, to ride aboard canoes,



rafts and hydro-speeds, waters where you can fish in the traditional way or “no kill” in the best spots selected by the project “Trentino Fishing”, respecting the balance of a prized array of fish species, including marble trout and Arctic char. Waters that are also rich in curative properties, that flow from the depths of rock and in which you can immerse yourself in one of the **eight spas** of Trentino, adding the benefits of the mountain climate to refresh and tone the body.







The mountain: a pantry of well-being

Walk and ride your bicycle to get into shape

Trentino, full of **trails**, itineraries and cycling paths suitable for all needs, is the ideal place to engage in healthy activities surrounded by nature. Riding a bicycle with friends or with the whole family on

the cycling paths of Trentino becomes a unique experience that combines wellbeing with the discovery of a territory that never ceases to surprise. The trail network extends for **440 km**, along every valley, and is served by 19 bicycle grills, by a timely system of signs integrated by the transport service “Bicibus”, but there are also large circuits dedicated to mountain



biking, such as the “Dolomiti Brenta Bike”, 160 kilometres in the Adamello-Brenta Nature Park, the “Mountain Bike” that reaches as far as Lake Garda, the “Dolomiti Lagorai Bike” through the Lagorai chain and the “Cento Chilometri dei Forti” on the Cimbri Highlands.

From 0 to 3000 m you can walk on a **trail system of over 5000 km** towards peaks, dairy huts and 146 mountain huts, with **trekking** excursions in several stages that are quite spectacular, such as the



“Dolomiti Brenta Trek”, in the two versions “experts” and “country”, the “Dolomiti Panorama Trek” with three separate routes, the “Palaronda Trek” in the Pale di San Martino Trek, the Trek-King in the Fassa Dolomites, and the Latemar Trek, where you can walk face to face with nature, woods, rocks, glaciers and thrills that are new each time. From the Cevedale Group to the Marmolada, 520 km of the **“Sentiero della Pace”** (“Trail of Peace”) unfold along the front line and through the Great War



theatres in Trentino, crossing military roads, passageways and trenches, and touching fortifications, tunnels, sites high up in the mountains and museums. A grand route of memory to reflect and meditate. Experiences to be enjoyed also thanks to the project “Let’s Dolomites” promoted by the Alpine guides of Trentino.

Trentingrana, Sprezza delle Giudicarie, Vezzena, Puzzone di Moena and Casolèt, while in terms of **freshwater fish**, we have the IGP rainbow trout and the Arctic char. The cold meats include Lucanica trentina, Ciuiga del Banale, Carne Salada and Mortandela della Val di Non, while among the vegetables are the organic products of Val di Gresta and the

asparagus of Zambana. Excellencies that are easily recognisable thanks to the Quality Brand Trentino. The symbol of a philosophy that is respectful of human health and the environment, it attests to the origin, full traceability and correspondence to high quality standards of the products.

Relax in nature

Green poetry

When someone says Trentino, you think of the mountains and pristine nature. And it couldn't be otherwise, considering that there are **nearly half a billion trees** and that 30% of its surface is "protected". Next to a widespread network of protected

areas are three green lungs, represented by the parks of Adamello Brenta, Paneveggio-Pale di S. Martino and the part of the Stelvio park located in Trentino. The first, placed in Western Trentino, is one of the vastest protected areas of all the Alps, with thousands of deer, roes, chamois, royal eagles and more than 40 brown bears. To the East we encounter the Nature



Park of Paneveggio-Pale di S. Martino, which includes a large forest of red spruce trees, known as Foresta dei Violini, whose precious wood is used to produce soundboards and a variety of musical instruments, including the famous “Stradivari”. More than thirty peaks **over 3000 metres a.s.l.** instead characterise the portion within Trentino of the Stelvio

National Park. In the summer months, several activities are organised to introduce visitors to the plant and wildlife protected in the three parks.

Trentino offers the opportunity to experience a summer full of culture. **Festivals, exhibitions, concerts and shows** are just some of the events designed for the hot months. Museums and castles are at the top of the list. Summer is the right time

to visit and admire temporary exhibitions, alongside the ones permanently on display. From the new Muse, the Science Museum designed by Renzo Piano, to the **Mart**; from Castello del Buonconsiglio to Le Gallerie; from Castel Thun to Museo degli Usi e Costumi della Gente Trentina (Museum of uses and customs of the people of Trentino); from Museo Diocesano Tridentino to Castel



Beseno; from Museo Storico Italiano della Guerra (Italian War History Museum) to Castel Stenico, there is plenty to choose from. But that's not all. Lovers of nature and music cannot miss the concerts of the festival [I Suoni delle Dolomiti](#) (Sounds of the Dolomites), scheduled to take place on the Unesco-protected peaks. Or you can enjoy the infinite possibilities tied to mountain filmography, protagonists of the Trento Film Festival. [Theatre and art](#), just to name a few, come together on the occasion

of the festivals Futuro Presente and Oriente Occidente, while world famous scholars gather in Trento to give life to the Festival dell'Economia (Festival of Economy).

Eighty forts, 19 dedicated museums and trenches also recount the path from war to peace known by this region thanks to a rich calendar of events planned on the occasion of the 100th anniversary since the outbreak of the First World War until 2018.

Between museums, castles and medieval villages

Trento and Rovereto, a treasure chest of art, history and culture

Trentino is a treasure trove of art, history and culture. The roots of the capital go back to Roman times: the [ancient Tridentum](#) still preserves traces of the city in the

archaeological site under the old town. Dominating the city is the [Castello del Buonconsiglio](#), a medieval fortress transformed by the Prince-Bishops into an elegant residence and today a prestigious museum. Other attractions are the [Cathedral](#), with its splendid square, and [the Muse](#), the Science Museum designed by Renzo Piano.



Rovereto, once under Venetian rule, has also always been a place of lively cultural exchanges. The city is home to the Mart, one of the most important contemporary art museums in Europe, and **Campana della Pace** (Peace Bell), whose chimes every night send a message of harmony among the peoples. The two cities, for some years now, have decided to give rise to the district "**TrentoRovereto. Città di Culture**", that can be accessed through the Museum Pass, which allows guests to move freely

by public transport – train and bus - and access the museums, castles and festivals of Trento and Rovereto. Or you can also use the **Guest Card Trentino**, which also allows use of the provincial public transport and grants access to over 90 museums, castles and parks.

State-of-the-art facilities, a fantastic environment and a vast network of volunteers in every valley make it an all-

year-round sports destination. The perfect outdoor location for a range of physical activities, from soccer to cycling, basketball to athletics, and volleyball to climbing, in summer the region is also the setting for a wide range of key events in the world's sports calendar. The Giro d'Italia is a must, with thousands of fans lining the route brimming with enthusiasm, especially for



the decisive Dolomites stages. A foretaste of the Giro is provided by the Tour of the Alps: formerly known as the Melinda Tour of Trentino it was rebranded in 2016 and takes place every year in April on the roads of Trentino, Alto Adige and the Tyrol. For sheer grit and excitement, every year sees Trentino MTB take off, a series of seven exciting events on exhilarating

singletracks and with off-road stages. From the mountains to the lakes, numerous Italian and foreign football teams hold their summer training camps in Trentino. Other top-class events include the **Italian volleyball and basketball teams** training sessions in Cavalese and Pinzolo, and the Rock Master Festival in Arco.

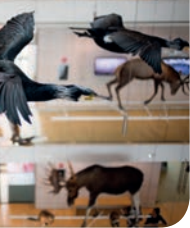

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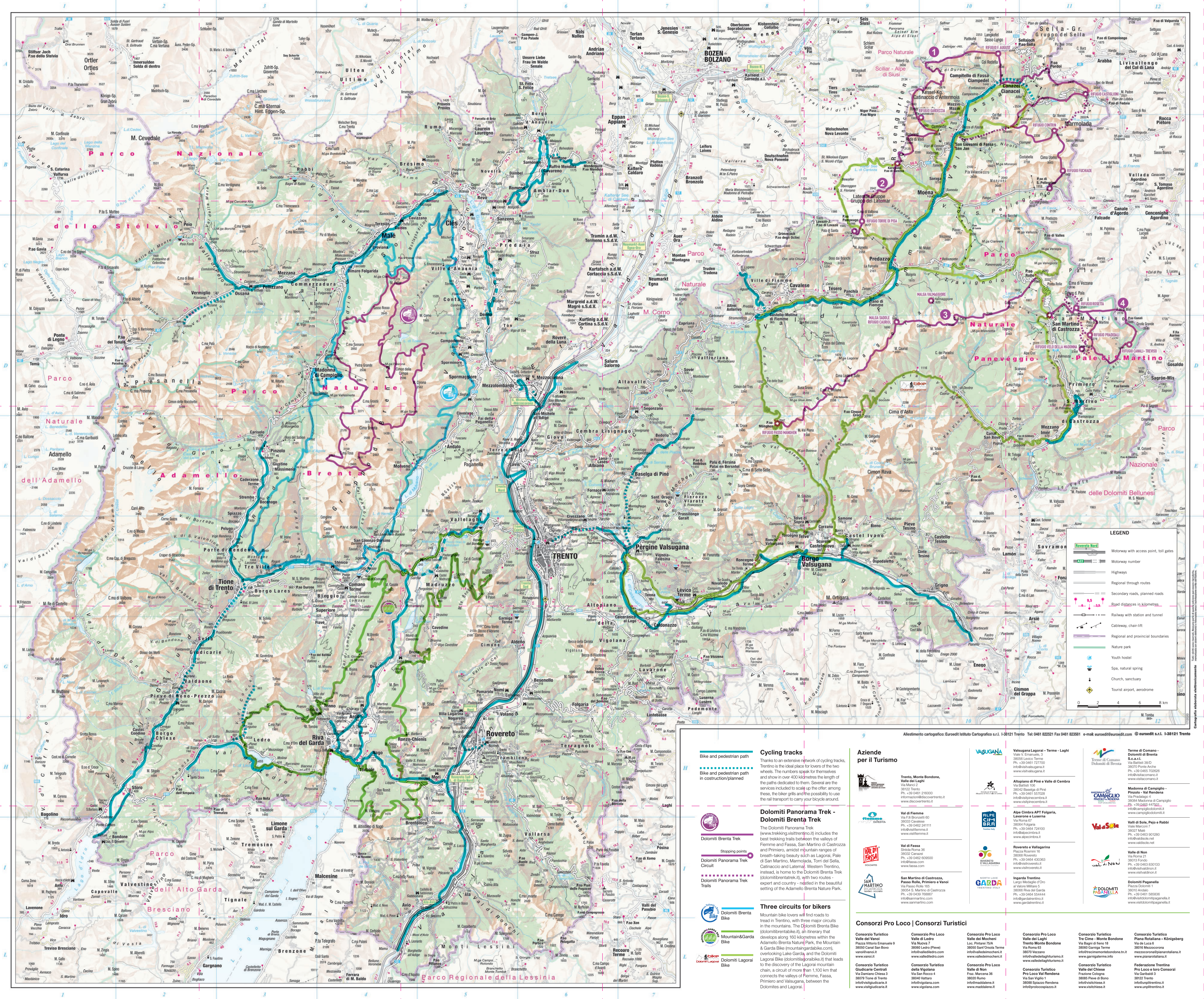
how to get here

Trentino is easily reached from the North and from the South, by train on the Verona-Brennero-Munich line and by car on the A22 Brennero highway. The closest airports are the Dolomiti San Giacomo of Bolzano (57 km), the Valerio Catullo of Verona (90 km), the Gabriele d'Annunzio of Brescia (135 km), the Marco Polo of Venice (163 km), the Bergamo-Orio al Serio (180 km) and those of Milan, Linate and Malpensa (approx. 250 km). For internal travel, there is the Trento-Malè railroad for reaching Valle di Non and Val di Sole, and the Trento-Venezia railroad that crosses through Valsugana, as well as the Trentino Trasporti bus lines.

Several are the services included to equip up the offer: among these, the biker grids and the possibility to use the rail transport to carry your bicycle around.

 The Dolomiti Panorama Trek (www.trekkingvisittrentino.it) includes the best trekking trails between the valleys of Fiemme and Fassina, San Martino di Castrozza and Primiero, amidst mountain ranges of breathtaking beauty such as Lagorai, the Dolomiti Lagorai Bike (dolomitalagorai.it) that leads to the discovery of the Lagorai mountain chain, a circuit of more than 1.100 km that connects the valleys of Fiemme, Fassina, Primiero and Valsugana, between the Dolomites and Lagorai.

Three circuits for bikers
 Mountain bike lovers will find roads to tread in Trento, with three major circuits in the mountains. The Dolomiti Brenta Bike (dolomitibrenta.it), an itinerary that develops along 160 kilometers within the Adamello Brenta Nature Park, the Mountain & Garda Bike (mountainandgarda.com), overlooking Lake Garda, and the Dolomiti Lagorai Bike (dolomitalagorai.it) that leads to the discovery of the Lagorai mountain chain, a circuit of more than 1.100 km that connects the valleys of Fiemme, Fassina, Primiero and Valsugana, between the Dolomites and Lagorai.

1 Pejo and Rabbi Mountain Farmhouses and Huts



In the heart of the Trentino section of the Stelvio National Park, the Pejo and Rabbi valleys, also renowned for the healing properties of their numerous spa water springs, conserve a widespread spontaneous architectural heritage consisting of mountain farmhouses and huts that extends from the bottom of the valley up to the edges of the forest line.

3 Pile-dwellings of Fivè and Ledro



The pile-dwellings of Fivè and Ledro, unique in their kind in our continent, tell the story of the people who from the 7th to the 1st Millennium B.C. lived on the banks of former Lake Carera and of Lake Ledro, through an extraordinary experience of the past. Fivè alongside Ledro is one of the two of the most important-dwelling sites in Europe, included in Unesco's list of World Heritage sites.

5 Lake Molveno



Set in the Adamello-Brenta Nature Park landscape, Lake Molveno is the largest natural Alpine lake in Italy at an altitude higher than 800 meters above sea level. It is surrounded by beech-woods and fir-woods. Its most astounding feature is the clearness of its water, the surface of which reflects the Brenta Dolomite mountains and the slopes of the Paganella.

7 Muse



Opened to the public in July 2013, The MUSE Science Museum is a structure designed by Renzo Piano with innovative architectural features. This is where parents can take their children to explore the global environment in a creative and unique manner. The museum uses the mountain metaphor to explain life on Earth, focusing on biodiversity, sustainability and environmental education.

9 Fort Belvedere



Fort Belvedere in Lavarone, one of the largest fortresses of the period, was built by the Austro-Hungarians between 1908 and 1912 and is one of the 19 WWI museums in Trentino. It is intact and can be visited in all its parts. It displays findings and multimedia installations that tell the story of the fort, of its garrison and of the military events that took place in the area.

2 Nardis Falls



Nardis falls, located in Val di Genova in the Adamello Brenta Nature Park, descend from the Presanella with a leap of over 130 metres, starting from an altitude of 921 m a.s.l. and at an inclination of 55-65°. The vaporization of the water as it crashes onto the rocks below and the special angle of the light at sunset always make these falls a very charming sight.

4 Piazza Catena



As one of Riva del Garda's most charming attractions, Piazza Catena offers a view that encompasses both the lake and the centre of the city. It derives its name from the large chain ('catena' is Italian for chain) that in bygone times was stretched across the water to defend the entrance to the port. Up until 1925 this square hosted the imperial tollhouse: the sign of a border that for centuries marked the northern portion of Lake Garda.

6 Santuario di San Romedio



Built on the summit of a rocky spur more than 70 meters tall, the San Romedio Sanctuary is one of the most characteristic shrines of Europe. It is formed by five small chapels built one on top of the other, joined by a stairway of 131 steps. The path leading to the sanctuary is one of Trentino's most charming pilgrimage routes.

8 Terraced Cultivations



The terraced vineyards of Valle di Cembra, crib of the Müller Thurgau wine, are a site of excellence of this historical rural landscape at provincial, national and European level. The Renaissance painter and engraver Albrecht Dürer highly appreciated the landscape qualities of this valley, set between the giddy scenery of the Adige river, the Dolomitic enchantment of the Fiemme and Fassa valleys and the wild outline of the Lagorai mountain range, by painting it in several of his water colours.

10 Artesella



Since the 90s, Val di Sella, lateral to Valsugana, is a veritable workshop for the artistic expressions linked to Land Art and harbour the results of the dialogue between individual creativity and natural environment. Thanks to the Cultural Association 'Arte Sella', there are over 300 of these artists sharing this project and creating their work on site and leaving it standing in its natural surroundings.

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11 Torri del Vajolet



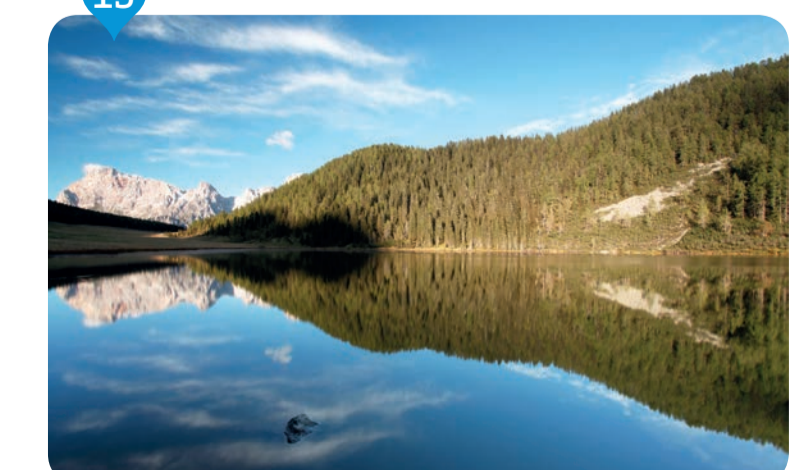
The Torri del Vajolet are peaks that stand above the wide Gardl valley in the heart of the Fassa Dolomites. They are one of the most popular landscapes of the Alps and of Dolomitic geography, icons of verticality and of mountain scenery beauty. They belong to the Catinaccio range that is listed as a UNESCO Human Heritage Site together with the Brenta Dolomites, Latemar, Pale di San Martino and Marmolada.

12 Paneveggio Forest



Known as the "resonant forest", the large state-owned Paneveggio forest is one of the most majestic green landscapes of the Paneveggio - Pale di San Martino Nature Park. It includes special "resonant" spruces that since the Middle Ages have been providing tonewood for the creation of the world's best sound boxes.

13 Lake Calaita



In the northernmost portion of the pasture valley of Lözen, lateral to Val Vanoi, the clear waters of this small lake, located at the foot of the Lagorai Group in its western part, reflects the majestic southern rock wall of Cimón de la Pala, symbol of the Pale di San Martino, that stands on the horizon.
